



Understanding Provider Price Variation in MA




- The MA Attorney
 General's Office (AGO)
 first identified provider
 price variation in the MA
 market in 2010
 - High-priced hospitals paid 3-4x more than low-priced hospitals in 2008

Provider price variation

- Seen in both fee-for-service and global payments
- Seen among both hospitals and physician groups
- Not due to differences in quality or patient severity
- Driven by market share
- Hospitals persist as higher- or lower-priced year after year


PRICES PAID TO PROVIDERS VARY SIGNIFICANTLY

Disparities grow as providers consolidate and volume shifts to higher cost providers


Harmful Effects of Provider Price Variation in MA



Volume shifts to higherpriced providers

- Higher-priced hospitals have high and growing shares of inpatient stays, outpatient visits, and revenue²
- In 2014, 80.3% of commercial payments for acute hospitals went to higher-priced hospitals⁵
- Higher-priced AMCs consistently hold the major share of total hospital payments (2010-2014)^{4,5,21}
- From 2011-2013, more than 80% of total physician group payments went to physician groups above the average relative price⁵
- Since 2009, three acute hospitals have closed or converted to other health care uses due to financial strain^{25,26,27,28}



Health care costs crowd out other priorities


State Budgets for Health Care Coverage and Other Priorities, FY2004-FY2014¹⁶








Health Costs

Make the most of your insurance coverage by knowing how much health care services cost. The price you pay will vary depending on what health care provider you go to and what health insurance company you are enrolled with.

- · Select your insurance company and plan type.
- Choose a category and then a service or procedure to see the cost.
- View the estimated total cost for facilities (2) and professionals (3) in New Hampshire.
- Confirm that a provider is covered by your plan by contacting your health insurance company before seeking care.



Transparency in Health Care



Successes

- Enables engaged consumer to learn in advance about care and costs
- Can drive prices down through comparison shopping, or the threat of it
- Becoming more sophisticated and timely

Failures

- Most consumers are unaware the information exists
- Largest portion of spending is for persons at no financial risk
- Available data limited in scope and use
- May cause price increases

All Payer Claims Dataset



- An aggregation of data files eligibility records, medical & pharmacy claims, provider information, insurance product details – compiled from multiple health benefits payers
- First statewide APCD in Maine in 2003
- About 20 states now have active APCDs
- Often a key part of a state's health information infrastructure
- Important privacy and security concerns

Why an APCD?



Support performance improvement

- Transparent reporting of provider and payer results
- Used by providers to drive better care

Rich information for public health & health policy

- How does spending differ by location? Patient mix?
- What are the trends in disease prevalence? Treatment choices?
- How do disease, treatments, outcomes, etc. vary by geography? By gender? By type of insurance coverage? By provider?
- Which providers are better/worse in quality and cost?
- Market oversight

Support for informed consumer choice

- Where should I be treated?
- What will it cost?
